“She called me and said, ‘Kirk, I want to do something for my kids.’ She knew what it was like to pay for college without the help of scholarships. The people that had helped her were long gone, but she felt that helping others would be a way to honor their generosity.”

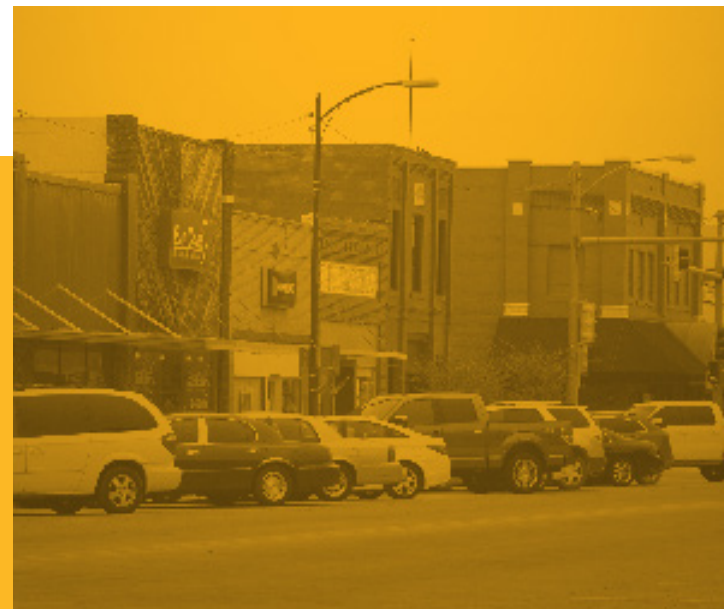

Our state is experiencing an unprecedented transfer of wealth, as estates change hands from one generation to the next. From 2021 - 2030, \$146.1 billion will change hands from one generation to the next in Kansas!

Many people allocate their entire estate to their children, but as more people leave the communities where they were raised, much of this inherited wealth will leave Kansas. It's increasingly important for Kansans to reinvest resources back into the places where they earned their living and enjoyed a good life.

If we **Keep 5 in Kansas** by capturing just 5% of this wealth transfer, up to \$7 billion could go back into our towns and cities by 2030. Community foundations are tax-exempt, nonprofit, autonomous, nonsectarian, philanthropic institutions. Their long-term goal is to serve local communities by building permanent funds supported by many donors. There are more than 100 community foundations across the state of Kansas.
